Introduction

Heathside School recognises the importance of preparing pupils for their future careers. We recognise that all young people need a planned programme of activities to aid their decision making and help them plan for the future. We also recognise the statutory right of all students to receive careers education and guidance.

The school offers a planned programme of careers education, information and guidance for all students. The school will seek to ensure that this guidance is appropriate to the age, stage ability and educational needs of each individual. This guidance is provided through careers events and activities, as well as forming part of the college's PSHE programme.

The careers policy has been written to ensure the Gatsby Benchmarks are covered. These have a key role in:

- raising young people's aspirations and promoting access to all career pathways;
- enabling all young people to develop the skills and outlook they need to achieve career wellbeing, including adaptability and resilience;
- underpinning the Department for Education guidance to schools on meeting their statutory responsibility for careers guidance.

- · The world of work; identifying types of careers / jobs that students might be interested in
- Recognising a variety of routes into careers college, apprenticeships, university etc.
- · Identifying goals for the future with specific reference to careers.
- · Risks and consequences when making financial decisions

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
